Donation Day Parade!

This Friday, GVCS will join in on the long held Donation Day Parade tradition! While a slightly different route will be followed, the spirit of compassion and giving is going strong. **Families are encouraged to send in non-perishable food this week** to their homeroom teacher.

Below is an account of the history of the Donation Day Parade as written by the Ladies Relief Society.

"Way back in the early 1800's, over 200 years ago, our little towns of Grass Valley and Nevada City didn't exist. Where we live was a beautiful wide-open countryside in the foothills of the Sierra Nevada mountains. Just imagine that there were no towns, no roads, no cars and no stores or restaurants! The only people living here were the Native American Indians.

In 1849 the precious metal, gold, was discovered in California. People from all over the country rushed here hoping to find gold and become rich. They were called "The 49ers", and the famous California Gold Rush began! They found gold in the rushing water of the rivers, used big hoses to blast it out of the hills and finally by digging tunnels underground, where they found the most gold. Men who were miners from as far away as Cornwall, England came here to work in our mines. (Cont pg 2)

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They brought their families and our towns were created with houses, stores, churches and schools. Some of you may even be the great great grandchildren of a miner from Cornwall! Mining was a very dangerous job and miners were often injured or even lost their lives. Their wives and children were left with no money.

Fortunately, the local people here were very caring and helped those in need. A group of women, soon known as the Grass Valley Ladies Relief Society, came together in 1873 to help those in need. An article in the newspaper saying that the women needed help for these families during the holidays was answered by a lady who often watched the children going to school, looking cold and hungry. She wrote a letter to The Union newspaper with the wonderful idea that on a special day in December, each could child bring a stick of firewood to heat a stove and one potato to school.

With hundreds of children bringing one stick of wood and one potato, they would be bagged and given to the most needy families. The ladies' group, the children, the store owners, and the whole town loved this idea. The young children marched in a parade in the streets of Grass Valley, proudly carrying a stick of wood and a potato and were excited to help. The high school also made donations. The store owners gave hams, apples, bags of flour or whatever they could. A band led them through the streets. Everyone had a great time!

The parade ended at what is now known as Grass Valley Charter School, where the ladies of the society collected all the donations, filled big canvas bags and delivered them to the families in need. It was a wonderful day for the whole town and became known as the Donation Day Parade.

Times have changed a lot since that first Donation Day almost 150 years ago. Instead of sticks of wood and potatoes, you, the children, now bring canned goods for the families in need. The ladies lead the parade carrying sticks of wood and potatoes, a reminder of the early days of The Donation Day Parade. An old fire truck often follows the children at the end of the parade to pick up bags of food left along the parade route. The collected food is delivered to Interfaith Food Ministry where people are now able to get food every week.

We can all be proud of our history and the long tradition of helping one another. Being generous and kind are the most important lessons to learn, no matter how young or how old we are. Thank you all for being a part of sharing with others."
